THE INSECT PEST RECORD FOR OKLAHOMA 1940

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THE MORE IMPORTANT INSECT PESTS **

Grasshoppers, the chinch bug, and the grain bug were the most outstanding insect problems in Oklahoma in 1940.

Grasshoppers—The following is taken from the annual report (type-written) by J. M. Maxwell, state leader in grasshopper control. The heaviest infestation occurred in Cimarron County although the western portion of Texas County was also heavily infested. Melanoplus mexicanus was the species causing most damage although Aeolopus turnbullii was also important locally. Of the 1509.3 tons of bait used in 1940, 1,061 were used in Cimarron County and 341.6 in Texas County.

Chinch Bugs—The chinch bug infestation in the state as a whole was the worst since 1933. Most damage was done in northeastern Oklahoma. An early season cool spell caused a heavy delayed emergence; as a result some early corn was infested by bugs emerging directly from hibernation. According to the annual report (typewritten) by C. F. Stiles, 16,916 gallons of creosote were used in constructing barriers, protecting 15,500 acres. The migrating bugs where no barriers were built damaged 33,703 acres with an estimated loss of \$77,582.00. Because of a warm late fall, the bugs went into hibernation later than usual, having caused damage to winter wheat in October.

The Grain Bug—(Chlorochroa sayi)—Considerable damage was done to late-planted wheat by this bug in Cimarron County. Russian thistle or tumble weed served as a native food plant from which the insects migrated to wheat where they clustered on the heads and sucked the tender green kernels dry. A survey showed that Cimarron and Texas were the only counties infested in Oklahoma. Beaver, Harper, Ellis, Woodward, and Weods Counties were surveyed but no infestation was found.
