examination we observed a green-colored praying mantis, approximately 10 cm in length, standing on the feeder while it held and fed on the hummingbird. We destroyed the mantis and observed that it had eaten a deep hole, approximately 1 cm in diameter, in the back of the hummingbird's neck. We had observed a mantis on the feeder on prior days, at which time hummingbirds seemed reluctant to approach, but we did not realize that it could capture such large prey. A large brown-colored praying mantis was found on the feeder the next day. The feeder hangs amid an arch of trumpet creeper (Campsis radicans) vines which could attract mantises.—Owen J.
