And with this issue, a youthful Operant Subjectivity completes its first decade of existence. Forty issues ago, in October 1977, William Ste-phenson's "Factors as Operant Subjectivity" was published, and served to launch this newsletter/-minijournal. Since that time, more than 1700 new ci-tations have appeared in "Q Bibliographic Update," which is almost three times the 590 references which



appeared in the 1968 bibliography (in *Perceptual and* Motor Skills), and attests to Q's continued momentum. Of the 110+ current subscribers, well over half have been subscribers since the beginning, indicating a dedicated core of persons interested in the broader issues which this newsletter has endeavored to feature. Almost 1500 pages have appeared between these covers during the same time period, primarily articles (70 of them, almost 30 by Stephenson), but also news and notes concerning initiatives in Canada, Latin America, Europe, Africa, Australia, and Asia. And there have been two international Q confer-

And there have been two international Q conferences (1985, 1986), with a third scheduled for November of this year (see below), all of which indicates the emergence of Q, and the science of subjectivity which it sponsors, as a perspective increasingly to be reckoned with in the fields of psychology, journalism and communication, political science, nursing, religious studies, medicine, adAnd so, from us all: Happy Birthday William Stephenson and Operant Subjectivity! Here's to another productive decade.
