

bears on the construction of a new scientific paradigm within the research tradition begun by Freud, with emphasis on the philosophical, metatheoretical, and methodological assumptions implicit in "the psychological principle of subjectivity." Brown argued against a division between the human and natural sciences, and drew on a study of value clarification to make a case for a distinction between psychoanalytic and generalized self psychology. A critique was provided by Martin J. Packer (Far West Lab for Educ Res and Developmt, San Francisco), whose "Hermeneutic Inquiry in the Study of Human Conduct" appears in the October 1986 issue of *American Psychologist*. This dialogue is scheduled to conclude with a roundtable discussion at the 1988 ISPP meeting in New York.
