More on Sir Cyril...

... and Kleinian Psychoanalysis

Mention was made in the January issue of resurgent interest in the works of Melanie Klein (with whom Stephenson was earlier associated) and of the "British School" of psychoanalytic object relations more generally. Persons interested in pursuing this avenue in more detail will be interested in five papers by James S. Grotstein which are scheduled to appear under the series heading "The Significance of Kleinian Contributions to Psychoanalysis," International Journal of Psychoanalytic Psychotherapy, forthcoming.

Grotstein and Susanna Isaacs Elmhirst, both of whom are practicing analysts associated with the British School, are to participate in a roundtable discussion on "Political Implications of Ego Psychological and Object Relational Personality Theories" at the next meeting of the International Society of Political Psychology (June 5-7, Boston); W. Gordon Lawrence (consultant, Tavistock Institute, London) will round out the British side. Representing theoretical developments in the United States will be psychoanalysts Vamik Volkan (University of Virginia) and Martin Wangh (Yeshiva University) and psychologist Paul Wachtel (City University of New York). One of the few Q-methodological studies from the standpoint of the British School is by Dani Thomas

(see Q bibliography, this issue). Stephenson is revising his own book-length manuscript on Q Methodology and Psychoanalysis, which was originally written prior to The Study of Behavior but never published.
